

Outing to Cathy Palmer-Lister's Cottage on Lac MacDonald

by Frank Tomaras, Director of Observational Activities, Montreal Centre On Saturday 2008 June 07, all Members of the RASC Montreal Centre were invited to go to Cathy Palmer-Lister's Cottage on Lac MacDonald (just North of Lachute) for our scheduled Deep Sky Observing outing. Cathy's beautiful Quebec style house is located on a private wooded area, and her private part of the Lake is less than 100 feet from the Cottage. Cathy has been inviting Montreal Centre members to her cottage for a number of years now. In some years, we set up our telescopes on her huge 20ft x 30ft deck and, at other times, on the beach beside the lake which has a beautiful unobstructed view of the southwest horizon. Cathy has even hosted a Corn Roast in some years! About 30 minutes before sunset, Cathy, Bill Strople, Santiago Lopez, Frank Tomaras, and our newest Montreal Centre member, Benoit Leduc, packed up our stuff and headed to an elevated area near Lost River known as the "Bone Yard." This particular site offers an excellent horizon all around and the Milky Way was plainly visible.

Late evening started out with partly cloudy skies, however the skies cleared just before sunset and remained clear all night. Santiago was setting up for a night of astrophotography and Benoit brought a nice 9.25" SCT on a German EQ mount. I brought my trusty deep sky telescope, a Celestron 12" F/5 Dobsonian reflector. The photo at right was taken by Santiago, and captures the region around Lyra. The moon and Saurn were obvious targets, and on this particular night, we were able to see 3 moons around Saturn. Some of the objects we observed



that night included a tour of the Virgo cluster of galaxies, the famous edge-on galaxy NGC 4565, the Whirlpool Galaxy, the Ring Nebula, the Dumbbell Nebula, globular clusters M13 and M4, and open clusters among many other targets. Benoit found and observed some of his first Messier objects -- looks like he is on his way to earning the Society's Messier Certificate. It was a very good deep-sky observing session and everyone who attended had a great time.

Bulletin Video of the Month

This month's offering is "Totality" by Canadian eclipse chaser and Toronto Centre member, **David Makepeace**. This short film follows Makepeace to five continents in pursuit of the Moon's shadow. Makepeace is a published eclipse writer and photographer, and his passion for eclipse chasing has been the source of stories featured in The National Post, Outpost Magazine, Toro Magazine and on CBC Radio. In 2003, he reported live for the Discovery Channel from the bow of a Russian icebreaker during the eclipse

in Antarctica.
