#### National Star Party – Saturday, 2018 September 15

The 2017 National Star Party held last July was the first ever – it was extremely successful with thousands of Canadians participating, celebrating Canada's 150th birthday.

To celebrate the Society's 150th, we are scheduling a National Star Party for Saturday, September 15. The date was chosen because on that evening the

Moon, Jupiter, Saturn and Mars will all be perfectly placed in the evening sky. As well, a date later in the summer is easier to manage for Centres at higher latitudes – it gets dark earlier.

We are planning to produce information sheets on observing these planets to hand out at the event. The Observing Committee is producing Mars observing info sheets as well.

#### **RASC Fundraising**

It's been a real privilege working with RASC over the past few months and learning more about the numerous and outstanding events and activities offered by the Society and Centres. You may know a new project has recently been announced; the RASC Robotic Telescope! In celebration of its 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary, the Society has initiated a special project to purchase and operate a 16-inch remote, automated telescope housed in an observatory in California's Sierra Nevada Mountains. This is a pristine, dark sky site with excellent observing conditions that will provide year round access to telescope images and data through a program now being developed. There is however a cost and members will be asked to kindly consider contributing to the annual site fee, maintenance and programming expense. Please visit

RASC is also actively seeking funds from foundations and government agencies in support of our charitable initiatives. We're applying for a grant from a federal fund; New Horizons for Seniors which awards up to \$25,000 to charities serving those 55 years of age and older. Application information has been shared with Centres that are registered charities. This grant is for select project costs related to program delivery for seniors.

As previously announced, the National Office has been awarded Canada Summer Jobs funding for the wages of two students employed in June and July. They'll assist with marketing, membership and fund development assignments. Other funding requests are pending; many will enhance the support RASC currently offers Centres and will allow us to serve members better.

We're also in the process of improving donation information and updating website content. Members may choose to support the Robotic Telescope project mentioned above, contribute to where the need is greatest, give to astronomy education or arrange a legacy gift. Options to make monthly gifts, donate stocks or make bequests have been introduced.

The RASC Fundraising Committee is in the process of reviewing fund criteria and gifting opportunities so we may best define how donors may designate their gifts.
