Dear Mr. Gerasimoff,

Thank-you for your letter of August 21. Your 7x50 binoculars should be ideal for searching for Comets and Novae, and you will be able to observe the brighter comets with your 2.4 inch. There are two ninth or tenth magnitude comets in the sky now, and you just might pick them up with your telescope if you have a dark, clear sky. Enclosed are notices on these comets.

In the magnitude column, you should record the star(s) of the faintest magnitude to which you actually search. For example, you may see eighth magnitude with your binoculars, but if you only identify stars down to sixth magnitude, you should record "6".

In the "Remarks" column, record any information that may affect your observation, such as a bright moon, aurora, thin clouds, twilight, etc. If you use more than one instrument in searching an area, this could be included in the "Remarks" column.

By the way, I correspond with Arthur Rae, who is also a member of the Windsor Centre. Do you know him? He could possibly assist you with this programme.
