Service Award – Roland Dechesne (Calgary Centre)

I would like to nominate Roland Dechesne for the National Service Award for his outstanding contributions to the Calgary Centre of the Royal Astronomical Society of Canada over many years.

Roland has been a member of the RASC since 1977 and has twice served as president of the Calgary Centre. He is currently Past President and Chair of the Membership Committee. Roland's efforts and commitment to the Society have been numerous, consistent, of high quality and with excellent follow-through. He has initiated, developed and maintains the Calgary Centre's presence on social media including Facebook, Twitter and the Calgary Meetup Group. He is a regular public speaker at RASC and University of Calgary sponsored public events as well as at many events hosted by other organizations.

Roland consistently tweaks and challenges his knowledge base through frequent research and literature reviews and regularly incorporates these in his talks. His latest public address contrasted bird themes of the night sky with the effects of light pollution on birds. He has been an active member of council for many years, frequently taking a leadership role in initiating new ideas and offering suggestions on overall policy and procedure. He was a key person in helping to create public star nights in the community of Vulcan, Alberta. He has done and continues to do extensive research on Light-Pollution Abatement.

Over the last several years he has researched roadway lighting laws in both Canada and in the US. He has often taken the lead in helping to develop responsible lighting policies along with communicating light-pollution issues with individuals, communities, local and regional governments. Most recently, he met with a city alderman at this latter's request to discuss lighting issues in Calgary. He has provided assistance to both the Lethbridge Astronomical Society and Waterton Lakes National Park with developing responsible lighting protocol. Roland's multi-level engagement with astronomy has been consistent for well over 10 years and has had a significant positive impact on the RASC as a whole. He continues to show a passion and a reach for excellence in all that he undertakes.

Service Award – Fred Smith (St. John's Centre)

Fred Smith is a long-time member of the St. John's Centre and has been an Executive Committee member for more than 15 years, including several years as President with an attendance record at public and executive meetings of more than 97%.
